**Quizzes:** Quizzes are typically given after every topic covered in class. Generally this will be every other week

**Tests:** There will be 3-4 interim assessments given throughout the year. A review guide will come out approximately 1 week before the test to give students time to prepare and study.

**Late work:** Late work is always accepted within the trimester. Students can also retake a test or assignment they did not do well on to get to an 80%.

**Missing Work:** It is <u>the student's</u> responsibility to obtain the homework assignments, notes & any other information that is missed during an absence. The missing work will be available on my website or in the missing work folder.

**Technology:** We will be using a variety of apps on the iPads in this class. Students are not allowed to be on unauthorized sites or social media apps and doing so could result in the loss of technology privileges.
